Clinical, Teaching and Research Interests

John V. Campo, MD, is Medical Director of Behavioral Health Services and Chief of the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at Nationwide Children's

Hospital and a Professor of Clinical Psychiatry and Clinical Pediatrics at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Dr. Campo completed medical school at the University of Pennsylvania and residencies in pediatrics at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and in general and child and adolescent psychiatry at the Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic of the University of Pittsburgh. He is board certified in pediatrics, psychiatry, and child and adolescent psychiatry. Dr. Campo is the recipient of National Institute of Mental Health funding and is an investigator in the Center for Innovation in Pediatric Practice at The Research Institute at Nationwide Children's Hospital. His interests include the relationship between medically unexplained physical symptoms and emotional disorders, psychosomatic medicine, and the delivery of evidence based behavioral health interventions, most notably in primary care. Dr. Campo has been honored as a NAMI Exemplary Psychiatrist and a recipient of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry's Simon Wile Leadership in Consultation Award.

Nancy Cunningham, PsyD, is the Clinical Director for Psychiatry and Community Behavioral Health at Nationwide Children's Hospital and a Clinical Assistant Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. She completed her clinical psychology doctoral degree at Wright State University and internship at The Ohio State University, Department of Psychiatry, and Division of Clinical Psychology. She has extensive clinical and administrative experience in mental health service delivery, most notably for youth with serious conduct disorders in both correctional and community settings. Dr. Cunningham previously served as Bureau Chief of Correctional Health Care for the Ohio Department of Youth Services, continues to sit on the state advisory committee for Behavioral Health and Juvenile Justice, and is a member of the Supreme Court Committee for the Mentally Ill and the Courts.

She is the recipient of multiple community grants to implement screening, assessment and intervention services in a variety of community settings, including juvenile courts, child welfare and schools.

L. Eugene Arnold, MD, MEd, is a child and adolescent psychiatrist affiliated with Behavioral Health Services at Nationwide Children's Hospital and a Professor Emeritus of Psychiatry at The Ohio State University Medical Center, where he was formerly Director of the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Vice Chair of Psychiatry. He is currently interim Director of the Nisonger Center. Dr.

Arnold is a medical graduate of The Ohio State University (OSU) and completed residency training and his MEd at Johns Hopkins University. He is a nationally recognized clinical researcher, scholar and recipient of the National Institutes of Health Director's Award for his work on the Multimodal Treatment Study of Children with ADHD (MTA), for which he continues as executive secretary and chair of the steering committee. He is co-investigator in the OSU Research Unit on Pediatric Psychopharmacology and chairs the steering committee of the RUPP Autism Network. A particular interest is alternative and complementary treatments for ADHD and treatments for autism.

Jeffrey A. Bridge, PhD, is an investigator in the Center for Innovation in Pediatric Practice at The Research Institute at Nationwide Children's Hospital and an Assistant Professor of Pediatrics at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Dr. Bridge is an epidemiologist with a major interest in pediatric mental health services research. He is currently working on a number of projects in this area, including a study funded by the National Institute of Mental Health examining the outcomes and quality of mental health services among adolescents who present to emergency rooms following a suicide attempt. His other primary research interest is focused on understanding the benefits and risks of pediatric antidepressant medication use.

Mary A. Fristad, PhD, ABPP, is a clinical psychologist affiliated with Behavioral Health Services at Nationwide Children's Hospital and a Professor of Psychiatry and Psychology at The Ohio State University (OSU) College of Medicine. Dr. Fristad completed her PhD at the University of Kansas and post-graduate training in clinical child psychology at Brown University. She is the recipient of ongoing National Institute of Mental Health funding, with research interests that include pediatric bipolar disorder, psychiatric assessment, and multiple family psychoeducational groups, and she is the first recipient of funding from the Jeffrey Fellowship and Endowment. Dr. Fristad is President-Elect of American Psychological Association Division 53, Society of Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology. She is Chair of the Appointments, Promotion and Tenure Committee for the OSU Department of Psychiatry and plays an important role in the training of psychologists and child and adolescent psychiatrists.

Bela M. Gandhi, MD, is a child and adolescent psychiatrist at Nationwide Children's Hospital and an Assistant Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at The

Ohio State University College of Medicine. She is board certified in both psychiatry and child and adolescent psychiatry. Dr. Gandhi received her medical degree from the Northeastern Ohio University College of Medicine, completed psychiatry residency at The Ohio State University, and the New York Presbyterian Hospital Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Residency Training Program of Columbia and Cornell Universities. She is the lead physician for the pediatric consultation-liaison, crisis and physician Decision Support services at Nationwide Children's.

William Gardner, PhD, is a clinical psychologist and investigator in the Center for Innovation in Pediatric Practice at The Research Institute at Nationwide Children's Hospital and a Professor of Pediatrics, Psychology and Psychiatry at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Dr. Gardner's interests include research to improve the quality of pediatric health and mental health services for children afflicted by chronic medical or psychiatric conditions, as well empirical research on research ethics. A primary focus is the development and implementation of clinical informatics, psychometric assessment tools and patient engagement strategies designed to enhance outcomes for children, adolescents and their families, particularly high risk families in public sector and primary care settings. Specific projects include designing new automated patient evaluation and monitoring tools, clinician decision support and methods of evaluating outcomes. Dr. Gardner is the lead investigator on a novel new study of safety monitoring for antidepressant treated youth using interactive voice response technology.

Richard H. Gilchrist, MD, is a child and adolescent psychiatrist at Nationwide Children's Hospital and an Assistant Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. He is triple-board certified in psychiatry, child and adolescent psychiatry, and pediatrics. He obtained his medical degree at The Ohio State University, followed by residencies at the University of Cincinnati (psychiatry), Mercy Hospital of Pittsburgh (pediatrics), and Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic and the University of Pittsburgh (child and adolescent psychiatry). Dr. Gilchrist's interests include psychosomatic medicine and psychopharmacology. After establishing the pediatric consultation liaison service at Nationwide Children's shortly after his arrival, he has applied his skills to the inpatient psychiatric care of youth at OSU-Harding Hospital.

Joseph W. Hatcher, PhD, ABPP, is a clinical psychologist at Nationwide Children's Hospital, a Clinical Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at The Ohio State University College of Medicine, and the Training Director for the pre-doctoral internship training program in professional psychology, the post-doctoral training program in clinical child psychology, pre-professional training for graduate students in psychology, social work and clinical counseling, and staff development training within Psychiatry and Community Behavioral Health. Dr. Hatcher completed his PhD in clinical psychology at the Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University followed by internship at the University of Tennessee Center for Health Sciences. He has been honored as a Leadership Development Fellow at the John Glenn School of Public Affairs of The Ohio State University.

Amy Hoisington-Stabile, MD, is the lead child and adolescent psychiatrist at the Nationwide Children's Hospital Dublin *Close To Home*SM Center and an Assistant Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at The Ohio State (OSU) University College of Medicine. An Ohio native and OSU graduate, Dr. Hoisington-Stabile completed medical, psychiatric, and child and adolescent psychiatry training at Wright State University. She shares responsibility for outpatient child and adolescent psychiatric leadership at OSU-Harding Hospital with Dr. Ghada Lteif and plays a critical role in resident supervision and training.

Kipp V. Kastens, MD, is the lead psychiatrist at the Nationwide Children's Hospital East Central *Close To Home*SM Center, where he provides assessment, consultation and treatment services, and a Clinical Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Dr. Kastens completed his medical training and residencies in general and child and adolescent psychiatry at The Ohio State University. His clinical interests include the assessment and management of youth with ADHD, depression and anxiety disorders, as well as teaching and collaboration with clinical psychologists and therapists.

Jarrold Leffler, PhD, ABPP, is a clinical psychologist and Clinical Coordinator at the Nationwide Children's Hospital East Central *Close To Home*SM Center and a Clinical Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Dr. Leffler provides psychological assessment and treatment interventions to youth and families, assists in the APA accredited internship program through supervision and teaching, and is supervisor of postdoctoral students and graduate level psychology practicum students. His clinical interests include mood and

disruptive behaviors and the delivery of multiple family psychoeducational group interventions in collaboration with Dr. Mary A. Fristad.

Nicholas Lofthouse, PhD, is a licensed clinical psychologist affiliated with Behavioral Health Services at Nationwide Children's Hospital and an Assistant Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at OSU-Harding Hospital and Co-Director of the Child and Adolescent Psychometric Laboratory at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Dr. Lofthouse provides evidence-based assessment and treatments for children, adolescents and families in the inpatient and outpatient settings and supervises a child and adolescent inpatient/outpatient psychometrist. He is active in resident education and serves as Chair of The Ohio Coalition for Evidence-Based Practice Education and The U.S. Child and Adolescent Inpatient Network (US-CAIN).

Ghada Lteif, MD, is the lead child and adolescent psychiatrist at the Nationwide Children's Hospital Westerville *Close To Home*SM Center and an Assistant Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Dr. Lteif is board certified in psychiatry and child and adolescent psychiatry. She received her medical degree at the American University of Beirut, then completed psychiatric residency at Saint-Joseph University and The Ohio State University, followed by child and adolescent psychiatry fellowship at Stanford University. She shares responsibility for outpatient child and adolescent psychiatric leadership at OSU-Harding Hospital with Dr. Amy Hoisington-Stabile and has a special interest and experience in the management of pediatric mood disorders.

Thomas A. Juanita Murawski, MD, serves as attending child and adolescent psychiatrist and medical director for the child and adolescent psychiatry inpatient unit at OSU-Harding Hospital and a Clinical Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Dr. Murawski completed residency training in psychiatry and child and adolescent psychiatry at the University of Cincinnati.

Brandon Strange, MD, is a child and adolescent psychiatrist in Behavioral Health Services at Nationwide Children's Hospital and an Assistant Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Dr. Strange is triple-board certified in child and adolescent psychiatry, psychiatry and pediatrics. His primary responsibility is providing outpatient psychiatric assessments for children and families in Community Based Therapy Services. Dr. Strange's area of focus is youth at risk of being victimized by engaging in violence and/or criminal behavior.

Glenn Thomas, PhD, is Clinical Coordinator for Community Based Services across Psychiatry and Community Behavioral Health at Nationwide Children's Hospital, where he has worked to establish, maintain and supervise several successful community based intervention teams in central Ohio, including in the juvenile justice and child welfare settings. He received his PhD in clinical psychology from the University of Kentucky. Dr. Thomas has developed several successful multisystemic therapy (MST) teams that provide evidence based and cost-effective treatment to youth with serious behavioral problems.

Kris West, PhD, is a member of Behavioral Health Services at Nationwide Children's Hospital and Supervisor of the CALL Program, a cross-system collaboration with Franklin County child protective services to assist with the identification of families with behavioral health needs in the child welfare system, and to provide behavioral health assessment, consultation and linkage to behavioral health services. Dr. West received his PhD in Clinical Psychology from the University of Kentucky.

Lynda Wolfe, PhD, is a licensed psychologist, Clinical Coordinator for outpatient behavioral health services at the Nationwide Children's Hospital Dublin *Close To Home*SM Center and Adjunct Assistant Professor of Psychology at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Dr. Wolfe received her PhD from The Ohio State University and has been with Nationwide Children's for 22 years. Her areas of specialty interest include the assessment and treatment of youth with ADHD and pre and post doctoral psychology supervision and training.
