Columbus Public Health – Childhood Injury Prevention Program Car Seat and Safe Sleep (Crib) Programs

The car seat program provides new, reduced-cost car seats to families in need. To get a car seat, moms must be 33 to 35 weeks pregnant, and caregivers must attend a 1-hour class. They also hold free car seat checks at fitting stations throughout Columbus. Seats are for children birth to school age. Call for classes, seat check dates, or an appointment.

Safe sleep classes are 1 hour. They are offered to families who need help getting a free crib.

Directions for Youth & Families

- Teen Parent Connection offers home, school, and community-based counseling, case management, and parenting programs to youth ages 12 to 21 who are parenting or pregnant. Referrals to other community resources are also provided.
- **Positive Paths Parenting Program** is for parents or caregivers with children of any age who want to learn basic parenting skills. Each class series has up to 8 hours of instruction. You will get a certificate when you're done. There is a fee for this program.

- All classes are held at 1515 Indianola Ave. Columbus, OH 43201, or may be virtual.

• **Ready Set Grow (Kindergarten Readiness)** offers an in-home kindergarten readiness program that works with children and their parent or guardian to help with learning and help parents with child development skills. It is for children 3 to 6 years of age who are not on-track to be ready for kindergarten. Call for eligibility requirements.

Help Me Grow/Healthy Families America

- Healthy Families America (HFA)— is for pregnant women, birthing people and new parents. If you or someone you know is pregnant or they recently had a baby, HFA right be right for you. If you choose to enroll; a specially trained family support specialist will visit with you during your pregnancy. They can keep visiting until your child is 3 years old. Phone: (614) 722-8222
- The Early Intervention Program helps families with children birth to 3 years of age who have developmental delays and disabilities. The program focuses on concerns about a child's development, such as an infant or toddler's language, feeding, walking, handling of toys, seeing, or hearing. There are no income requirements. Spanish interpretation is provided. Caregiver photo ID and a sonogram, birth certificate, or medical record is required for each qualifying child ages 3 and under.
