Beyond Seeing Patients: Rewards of a Career in Medicine

My initial career goals while going to college were to get an advanced degree after graduation in some basic science discipline, do some basic science research, teach at a postcollege level and interact with trainees. I accomplished that through a degree in Anatomy and taught medical and graduate students for over six years. While this was very satisfying, I periodically found myself involved in certain clinical scenarios

with my students which I greatly enjoyed. This prompted me to re-evaluate things, and I decided to pursue a career in clinical medicine. I started my training and then practice in pediatrics over 30 years ago, and I have tremendously enjoyed primary care and found this to be very satisfying. However, 18 years ago I was given the opportunity to work with our local Franklin County Public Health Department as their medical director. In many cases these positions are filled by physicians who practice in the communities they serve. While I embarked on this endeavor with some trepidation, because I did not have formal public health training, it has not been difficult to learn and get appropriate training in these areas.

Single Visit Surgery

The Section of Pediatric Surgery offers a Single Visit Surgery program for outpatient surgeries at the Westerville Surgery Center. Identified patients are seen in clinic in the morning and receive surgery in the afternoon, upon diagnosis confirmation. Follow up is typically completed via phone call from a nurse.

Single Visit Surgery is reserved for patients with definite surgical conditions that can be treated on an outpatient basis. Potential diagnoses include:

- Umbilical hernias
- Epigastric hernias
- Inguinal hernias
- Hydroceles
- Undescended testicles, greater than 12 mo of age
- Lumps, bumps or cysts
- Circumcisions over 4 mo of age

Updated Practice Tool Offers Guidance to Diagnosing and Managing Pediatric Hypertension

To determine pediatric hypertension, physicians must consider blood pressure, gender, age and height. The Section of Nephrology at Nationwide Children's has developed a practice tool to help providers evaluate and manage the condition. The tool includes updates from the American Academy of Pediatrics, definitions and guides to taking measurements, diagnosing and treating hypertension. Use of an Ultrasound Template to Diagnose Appendicitis Cuts Radiation Exposure and Costs

To diagnose appendicitis, a common reason for children to undergo abdominal surgery, the American College of Radiology recommends use of ultrasound before CT scans, to reduce radiation exposure. Surgeons at Nationwide Children's developed a standardized ultrasound template, in order to improve the quality of the ultrasound diagnoses. Using the template, they reduced CT rates by 78 percent, which not only reduce the risk for malignancy due to radiation exposure but saved more than \$100,000 in imaging costs, the surgeons estimate. They suggest other institutions would also benefit by incorporating a template. To learn more, visit **PediatricsNationwide.org.**

Breastmilk is the preferred option for feeding babies and while supplementation is sometimes needed, it has been applied with great variation, often to the detriment to the child and breastfeeding success. Remembering Edward James Kosnik Jr., MD

Dr. Edward James Kosnik Jr., was born at home in Baltimore, MD, in 1945. He grew up with five sisters who called him Buzzy and was a graduate of Loyola College and University of Maryland Medical School. During a surgical internship at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, he met the love of his life, Sally. They were engaged ten days after meeting and married three months later. After one year training in neurology at NYU - Bellevue Medical Center, they moved to Columbus in 1971 for his residency in neurological surgery at The Ohio State University.

As a pediatric neurosurgeon, Dr. Kosnik devoted 34 years of his life to patients at Nationwide Children's performing more than 12,000 surgeries. He held many leadership positions including Medical Staff President. In 2008, he was named Ohio Neurosurgeon of the Year. He trained many neurosurgeons including several who also specialized in

pediatric neurosurgery; his youngest daughter was the most meaningful.

While accomplishing professional goals, Dr. Kosnik and his wife Sally raised four daughters and have been blessed with eight grandchildren. He instilled in his daughters the values of hard work, compassion, perseverance, and selflessness, while inspiring them to pursue careers related to health care. He was an avid fisherman and loved spending time in Charleston, SC, on his boat "Special Lady" named after Sally. His other interests included crabbing, collecting Corvettes, antiques, carousels, Lionel trains, wood working, furniture building and restoring boat motors.

Phase 1 focused on supporting the research, design, and development of new ideas and innovative solutions at the intersection of affordable housing and employment and economic opportunities. Fannie Mae received hundreds of proposals from across the U.S., and Nationwide Children's submission was one of three selected as contract awardees for Phase 1 of The Challenge. HOMECARE UPDATE

Newest Homecare Medicaid Regulations and Forms

This year the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) instituted significant revisions to the conditions of participation (CoPs) that home health agencies are required to implement in order to participate as a Medicaid provider.

CMS requires Homecare provide a comprehensive approach to coordination of care and must:

- 1. Assure communication with all physicians involved in the plan of care.
- 2. Întegrate orders from all physicians involved in the plan of care to assure the coordination of all services and interventions provided to the patient.

This expectation requires Homecare clinicians and staff communicate with referring physicians more often in order to provide the expected patient-centered, interdisciplinary approach to care.

Help us keep Homecare compliant and always provide physician signatures at the point of referral.

Physician signatures are required on verbal orders, including supplemental or prn, and the Plan of Care (POC) Form.

 Physician review and signature on revision of the plan of care. The individualized plan of care must be reviewed and revised by the physician who is responsible for the home health plan of care and the HHA as frequently as the patient's condition or needs require, but no less frequently than once every 60 days, beginning with the start of care date.
