The Joys and Challenges of Rural Pediatrics

I often tell my medical students to not just pick out a specialty, but first, pick out a place where they want to live. Being happy with one's life is more important than just being happy with one's job. If a person prefers to live in a rural setting, then they probably should not become a neuro- or cardiovascular surgeon that requires a fairly dense population to support their specialty. Happiness needs to surround a person in all aspects.

I knew I needed rural life and pediatrics fit that just fine. At times, it has been frustrating: there have been few, if any, peers with whom to converse, there have been precious few medical support systems such as labs and X-rays readily available. The call schedule ... well, that doesn't exist as I am the only one on call. Time off has been few and far between, and hardly any other physician/hospital has ever felt the need to help. I have been told not once, but multiple times, "you picked it, you live (deal) with it". And the pay — well, it's rural — jobs are not readily available, family incomes are low ... need I say more? Those are just a few of the frustrations that come to mind.

But, on the other hand, the opportunities and joys are many.

Adolescent Medicine Substance Abuse Program

Incidences of drug overdose are continuing to climb. In the United States from August 2016 to August 2017, there were more than 67,000 deaths due to drug overdose. Between 1999 and 2016 almost 57,000 adolescents and young adults (ages 15-25 years) have died from a drug overdose. Almost 4 million 12-25 year olds have a substance abuse problem in the United States, but only 9 percent get any sort of treatment.

Because virtually all addictions start during adolescence, Nationwide Children's Adolescent Medicine Substance Abuse Program is designed to help adolescents who are abusing a full range of substances. Our multidisciplinary team of adolescent medicine and substance abuse experts include physicians, nurses, social workers and a substance abuse counselor. Our team conducts a formal substance abuse assessment and medical exam and determines the appropriate treatment plan as well as the best place for that treatment. Located on the Nationwide Children's Hospital campus, Adolescent Medicine is able to care for the whole patient including basic medical care and mental health issues. Our team works in a partnership with the referring primary care physician, or we can take over all of the medical care if that is what is desired.

Guidance for Workup and Imaging for Lower Back Pain and Possible Spondylolysis

School-age children commonly suffer lower back pain but in up to 80 percent of cases, no specific etiology is found. Thomas L. Pommering, DO, chief of Sports Medicine at Nationwide Children's, provides guidance on employing a workup to rule in or out causes, when an inflammatory etiology is suggested and how to proceed accordingly. Dr. Pommering also offers parameters for identifying spondylolysis and the benefits and potential harms of different imaging modalities used to diagnose the causes of pain. Measure Helps to Detect Hemiplegic Cerebral Palsy Early

Early detection of cerebral palsy (CP) allows for earlier interventions and increases chances for better outcomes, but diagnoses without specialized tools and training have proven difficult. Researchers at Nationwide Children's, led by Nathalie Maitre, MD, PhD, director of NICU Follow-up Programs, may have found a simple solution. In a study of 74 infants with CP, the researchers discovered that an asymmetry score from the Hammersmith Infant Neurological Examination (HINE) used in combination with a total HINE score can differentiate young children with hemiplegic CP from typically-developing children.
