Letting Go of The Screen (My 15-year Journey with an EMR)

When our practice first "went live" with electronic medical records in 2003, my fellow physicians compared the process to two other important events from that year. Some compared it to the completion of the human genome project, while others compared it to the massive Allied air strikes on the country of Iraq. It was a painful transition for a group that had many cumulative years of documenting on paper. As a physician who learned how to document on paper, sharing my physician/patient relationship with a computer screen was initially not comfortable for me.

After the initial transition from paper was over, and the electronic chart was populated with all of this excellent data, I relished in having the information at my fingertips. A slight touch of the screen or a click of the mouse, and I was omniscient — yes ma'am the head circumference percentile was 57% and yes that prescription was refilled last week, and no you did not have strep throat at that visit three years ago. I was a wizard.

But, my "superpower" also came with a price.

Easy-to-Use Phone App Better at Measuring Hydration Status Than Common Clinical Tests

An application for mobile phones performs better than many current clinical urine concentration tests, providing clinicians or patients a practical way to monitor hydration status. The app, developed by a team at Nationwide Children's, may be particularly useful in helping children with kidney stones, urinary tract infections, autosomal dominant polycystic kidney disease or other conditions prevent complications. The team of nephrologists and technology development specialists describe the app and performance in *Frontiers in Pediatrics*.

Pulmonary Rehabilitation for Children With Asthma Yields Clinical Benefits

Pulmonary rehabilitation, a standard treatment for adults with chronic lung diseases, can also improve lung function and quality of life (QOL) for children with asthma, physician-researchers at Nationwide Children's show. The program, featuring exercise, asthma education and nutritional counseling, led to significant improvements in the 6-minute walk test, FEV1, shortness of breath score and patient-reported physical QOL. More than 60 percent of participants had evidence of a positive clinical outcome after completing the program. The program study is in *Pediatric Pulmonology*.

Guidance and Resources for Talking With Kids About Suicide

Physicians can help support and educate parents on the importance of talking about depression or suicide with their children. Suicide experts say that asking a child directly about suicidal thoughts is usually the best way a parent can help their child open up about their emotions. Checking-in regularly cannot only foster a life-saving conversation but let children know it's healthy to talk about serious emotional concerns with them or other trusted adults, or to reach out to their own friends to have these conversations. GME FUN FACTS

In 2017-18 Nationwide Children's trained more than 900 residents and fellows. It sponsored 67 different programs for 164 residents and 152 fellows plus nearly 600 rotating trainees.

- Pediatric surgery started in 1952, pathology in 1953, and neonatology in 1984.
- The most recent ACGME-accredited program is Hospital and Palliative Medicine (2015).

Phototherapy Referral Process

As with all Homecare referrals, phototherapy referrals are initiated with a call from the referring physician/practice.

- To make a referral, call (614) 355-1100 or (800) 466-2727.
- Calls are answered between 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.
- Be prepared to discuss insurance eligibility, demographics and patient scheduling.

Referrals for phototherapy are made based on high bilirubin levels read by the patient's physician.

Until recently, Homecare's phototherapy program used nurses to train families on how to use the phototherapy equipment. Nurses would take the equipment to the families homes, or meet them at a *Close to Home* Center to train parents. The Phototherapy Program is now managed by Homecare Medical Equipment (HME), and HME technicians deliver the equipment to the home and train the family how to use it.

Patients are under supervision of their primary care physician who will continue to monitor bilirubin levels daily. When the baby is released from use of the phototherapy equipment, Nationwide Children's Homecare will discharge the service and arrange to pick-up the equipment at the patient's home or physician office.

HME technicians are scheduled to deliver and setup phototherapy equipment in patients' homes between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m., seven days a week. Homecare HME technicians are available after regular business hours, 24 hours a day, seven days a week to answer patient and referral questions on the phone.
