FEATURED PHYSICIAN



As the world's first colorectal surgeon to be fellowship trained in both pediatric and adult colorectal surgery, Alessandra Gasior, DO, **FACS**, has a unique perspective to provide the best clinical options for patients of any age.

Dr. Gasior is the medical director of Colorectal Transitional Care at Nationwide Children's and a

surgeon with The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center's Division of Colon and Rectal Surgery. This joint role with the two institutions allows her to guide patients with colorectal conditions through a smooth transition of care once they reach adulthood. She has performed over 1,000 complex pediatric colorectal cases, including minimally invasive and robotic surgeries. Her experience with adult patients is vast, including over 500 adult colorectal cases.

Dr. Gasior's areas of clinical interest include transitional care for anorectal malformations, Hirschsprung disease, and inflammatory bowel disease (Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis). Her research interests include improving quality of life, documenting adult experiences and enhancing the transition to adult care among adolescents and young adults with colorectal conditions.

Dr. Gasior, who also serves as associate professor of Surgery at The Ohio State University College of Medicine, is a fellow of the American College of Surgeons (FACS) and board-certified by the American Board of Colon and Rectal Surgery and the American Board of Surgery in both surgery and surgical critical care. She trained at Kansas University Medical Center in Kansas City, Kansas, for General Surgery Residency. She completed a Surgical Critical Care Fellowship and Surgical Scholars Fellowship at Children's Mercy Hospital in Kansas City, Missouri. Dr. Gasior also completed both Minimally Invasive Pediatric Surgery Fellowship and Pediatric Colorectal Surgery Fellowship at Nationwide Children's. She then completed an Adult Colorectal Fellowship at The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center.

HOMECARE UPDATE

Homecare Nurses: The Heart of Homecare

During May, Homecare recognizes the nurses who founded Homecare 35 years ago. Their commitment to providing premier pediatric care from inpatient to home created the need for increased pediatric home health care for patients in central Ohio. To answer patient needs, Homecare began adding services that expanded the volume and type of care the team could provide. During the past three decades, Homecare has continued to grow alongside the hospital to support the community, allowing children to go home to continue or complete needed medical treatments – from life-saving infusions to enteral feeds to a variety of therapy services in their homes.

Homecare nurses provide care to children in 16 counties. In 2024, Homecare's intermittent skilled nurses expanded their services to seven additional counties: three in the Toledo region (Lucas, Wood and Hancock) and four in the central Ohio region (Knox, Muskingum, Perry and Hocking). The Homecare team appreciates and celebrates their nurses, who continue to give their best every day for patients.
