New to Practicing in Central Ohio? Tips from a Former Medical Nomad

Being an outsider is always difficult, but being new to the area, as a pediatrician, was a much easier transition here than in the other places I have worked.

I did my medical training and residency in St. Louis, and so when I took my first job in North Carolina I knew it would be more difficult than if I had stayed back where I did my training. Who would I call if I had a question in a particular specialty? Who do I call to direct admit a patient? There was a huge learning curve in the first few years, but eventually I figured out the system. Subsequently, I had to move again due to a job change for my husband, and it was back to square one.

However, my experience when joining my practice here in Columbus was different than my first two moves.

Guides to Evaluate Common Sports Injuries

Concussions and injuries to the knees and shoulders are the most common sports-related injuries among the 2.5 million reported annually. The Section of Sports Medicine at Nationwide Children's has written guides to help primary care physicians assess and diagnose these injuries. National Survey Shows Emergency Department Management of Self-Harm

Emergency departments regularly provide half of 10 evidence-based management practices when treating patients who present with self-harm. A national survey of hospitals showed

that 90 percent commonly assess patients for current and past suicidal thoughts/behaviors and access to lethal means and 79 percent provide a list of professionals or agencies patients may contact when in a crisis. However, just 15 percent of hospitals provided all the recommended safety-planning elements. Learn more at PediatricsNationwide.org.

Common Clinical Markers Predict End-stage Renal Disease in Children With Obstructive Uropathy

Children with obstructive uropathy may suffer significant damage to their kidneys and urinary tract during fetal development or after birth, increasing their risk of end-stage renal disease. Up to half will end up needing renal replacement therapy. Researchers have found that age-specific baseline measurements and measurements over time of eight common markers collected from testing urine and serum chemistries may help them predict who will need the therapy, and, ultimately, allow them to intervene earlier. Cystic Fibrosis Team Receives Grant for Research and Mission Work in India

Historically there has been a belief that Cystic Fibrosis (CF) does not occur in people of Indian descent. A member of Nationwide Children's Pulmonary Medicine team, Grace R. Paul, MD, sought to challenge that belief. Dr. Paul worked with her friend and colleague, Dr. Sneha Varkki from the Christian Medical College in Vellore, India, to demonstrate that CF does indeed occur in the Indian population. As a result of their work, Drs. Paul and Varkki were invited to submit a grant to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation which resulted in them receiving nearly \$500,000 to fund a three-year demonstration project to train medical teams in India in the diagnosis and treatment of CF.
