Acid Suppression Should Not Be the First Treatment for Infants With Reflux

Studies fail to support the use of acid-suppression medications in infants with gastroesophageal reflux, a data review led by Steven Ciciora, MD, director of the division of educational activities in the Division of Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition at Nationwide Children's, found. In fact, a number of studies indicate the drugs may be associated with harmful effects in young children. New clinical guidelines emphasize use of non-pharmacologic treatments, such as thickening feeds or altering formula, and clear communication with caregivers. New Tool Can Help Physicians Identify Child Sex Trafficking Victims

A new study found that more than one in 10 minors visiting emergency departments, child advocacy centers and teen clinics for sexual trauma or assault are victims of child sex trafficking (CST). The research, led by Mary Jo Bowman, MD, attending physician in emergency medicine at Nationwide Children's, used one of the first CST screening tools specifically developed and evaluated in a health care setting. The researchers hope to expand use of the tool to other providers, particularly to address children with behavioral or mental health issues that may increase risk.

Insulin Resistance May Cause More Frequent, Complex UTIs in People With Diabetes

Children and adults with diabetes suffer more frequent and complex urinary tract infections compared to the general population. Excess glucose in the urine has long been considered the cause, but new research led by John David Spencer, MD, a nephrologist and principal investigator in the Center for Clinical and Translational Research at Nationwide Children's, indicates that may not be the case. The researchers show that insulin resistance results in a lowering of natural defenses and suggest resistance alone or in combination with excess glucose lead to susceptibility.

HOMECARE UPDATE

New Year, New Process for Homecare Medical Equipment Fulfillment

Homecare has a new process for fulfilling Homecare Medical Equipment (HME) referral orders. The new process enables staff to ensure appropriate equipment, formula or other supplies are being received by the appropriate families in the time frame requested. This new process includes contacting the referring physician and/or practice if there are any difficulties in contacting families to confirm their location and patient information.

Once the referral order is processed, an HME Ordering Specialist calls the family to coordinate delivery. If there is no answer or response from the family, a second call is made the next day. If contact with the patient's family has still not been completed, a third and fourth attempt are made. If by the fourth attempt no contact can be made to confirm patient information and family location, Homecare will consult the referring physician, or practice with the documented attempts to contact and deliver the HME supplies requested.
