
Sickle Cell Disease Awareness Month


Sickle cell disease is a genetic disorder characterized by periodic crises when sickle-shaped red blood cells clump together in the small blood vessels causing a variety of problems, including severe pain.



An estimated 100,000 people live with Sickle Cell Disease in the U.S. and millions are affected globally.
